CERT DRILL: AN OUTSTANDING SUCCESS! Because of all of you, the co-owners of our CERT program, our drill on June 21st was a huge success. **84** CERT members participated. My thanks to everyone for your commitment to CERT!

CERT RADIO NET: **CERT Radio Net exercises occur the second Monday of each month at 8 P.M.** Tune in to CERT Channel Command 3 (Channel 3) on your CERT hand-held radios. Those of you with a CERT radio, please keep the radio turned on to Channel 3 at all times. This will allow you to get early alerts to a CERT deployment or be contacted quickly when we need a few members and are not going to a full E-Sponder alert. Your radio charger controls the charging levels for the radio batteries so keeping the radio turned on and in the charger continuously is OK!

TRAINING Refresher: Triage. We use the S.T.A.R.T. Triage system in Monterey CERT. S.T.A.R.T. = Simple Triage And Rapid Treatment. The Triage tags (shown below) you learned with in CERT class are the same tags you will find in your neighborhood CERT containers. When you first enter the Mass Casualty Environment, give the following verbal direction: “Anyone who can get up and walk to me, please do so now”. Those patients who can walk and follow this simple command are categorized **MINOR**. Remember to keep the victims categorized “MINOR” near you so you can use them to assist the more severely injured. With those categorized “MINOR”, re-assess them later in the incident to assure they have not deteriorated. Next, **start where you stand** with the victim closest to you. Use the simple mnemonic: **30, 2, Can DO**. If the victim’s respirations are more than 30, if their capillary refill (fingernail color) takes longer than 2 seconds, or they cannot follow simple directions, categorize them **IMMEDIATE** and move to the next patient, stopping only to treat life threatening injuries such as compromised airway, severe bleeding and shock. If you cannot see the capillary refill because of nail polish, feel for the pulse at the wrist. If it is palpable, this is a pass, if faint, they are an immediate. If the victim’s respirations are less than 30, their capillary refill takes less than 2 seconds AND they can follow simple instructions and answer questions about their name, circumstances, location, etc., categorize them **DELAYED**. With non-breathing victims, assess for 10 seconds looking at the chest, listening and feeling for breathing. If absent for the 10 seconds, re-position the head and assess for another 10 seconds. If breathing remains absent after the second assessment, categorize **DECEASED** and proceed to the next patient. **Attach the tags to either the wrist or ankle.**

Trailer Continued: We will be formulating a detailed proposal to approach service clubs, insurance companies and other donors. The picture above shows the general concept. Our total funding goal for the trailer and all equipment should be approximately \$14,250. The trailer will be equipped similarly to our CERT containers throughout the community.

CONTACT YOUR TEAM LEADER: If you have not already done so, contact your team leader and meet them at your neighborhood CERT container. Make sure you know how to find the container, and are familiar with the inventory.

REMEMBER: After an emergency such as an earthquake, storm or other potential disaster when all forms of communication are absent, when the power is out and telephones and cell phones don't work, secure your family, immediate neighbors and then, if you are able, report to your neighborhood CERT container. Using our radio system, CERT is the primary eyes and ears to the City on what's happening in the neighborhoods. We will form teams and proceed into the neighborhoods to *"DO THE MOST GOOD FOR THE MOST PEOPLE"*



MAKING UP A MISSED CLASS: If you have already taken CERT, but perhaps missed one or two classes, you need only make-up only those missed modules to graduate and receive your CERT helmet & vest.
